

Sock-Knitting Frames

The extended title was on the first slide of my presentation at the SIHG members' evening on 12 December 2017.

SOCK-KNITTING REPORT 1986 - 2017 (with a long gap)

SIHG, the Association for Industrial Archaeology,
Godalming Museum,
East Midlands links, the Stocking Frame,
the Circular Sock Machine,

In 1986 the Association for Industrial Archaeology held its annual conference at Loughborough University. Some members of SIHG attended the weekend conference and the coach trips in the following week. We were reminded of the early framework knitting industry around Godalming and its survival, first by specialising in fleecy underwear and later in high quality outerwear, which continued through most of the twentieth century.

At the time, plans were underway in the East Midlands to commemorate the 400th anniversary of the invention of the stocking frame by William Lee in 1589 and we decided to mark the occasion in Surrey. Godalming Museum liaised with our contacts in Leicester and Nottingham to organise a series of events in 1989.

The museum organised a 'Wool Year' of displays and activities and designed a town trail around associated sites and surviving buildings. The museum's stocking frame was restored to a semblance of working order in 1988 by a technical expert from Ruddington Framework Knitters Museum near Nottingham. SIHG arranged for Marilyn Palmer, President of the AIA and author of the Shire Album on framework knitting, to give a talk in the 1988-9 lecture series at the University of Surrey, and to host a residential week-end at Loughborough University in April 1989. Members of SIHG and Friends of Godalming Museum were joined by members of the West Surrey Guild of Spinners, Weavers and Dyers and a few other interested individuals.

I undertook to research the history of the industry in the Godalming area, including recording relevant buildings. Documentary sources were found in Godalming Museum and the Surrey History Centre and also in libraries and record offices in London and Nottingham. I wrote up my work in two main publications:

Knitting Machines

Godalming Museum's stocking frame was presented to the Borough in 1936 by Allen Solly & Co. of Arnold, Nottingham, who had a factory in Godalming from 1860 to 1888. It made four stockings at once, seen hanging on the needles in the photograph (right).


The treadles at the base operate cords on the large pulley wheel which move a runner called a **slurcock**. This slides along a track, releasing shaped metal plates called **jack sinkers** one by one so that they fall and push the knitting yarn down between pairs of needles, forming loops. A second set of sinkers, the **lead sinkers** (set in lead) are brought down all at once to divide the loops

and equalise them. A presser bar is brought down to close the needles, which are of the open, or **bearded** type (page 6). Then the needles are moved back, drawing the yarn through the loops of the previous row of knitting. The result is a flat piece of knitting which has to be seamed to form a garment.


Circular knitting machines with latch needles (see page 6), which made stockings in the round, were introduced in the mid-nineteenth century. They were small and suitable for domestic use and small-scale production in institutions, including those that employed disabled people. Manufacturers of the machines included Fosters of Preston, Griswold of Leicester and Harrisons of Manchester. Large numbers of machines were manufactured in the First World War to supply socks to the troops.

The importance of socks in the First World War

During the war, knitters were called upon to knit for the war effort and were provided with sock machines on condition that they made at least 30 pairs of socks. Socks made by machine had to be joined up at the toe



and this was generally done with a hand-sewn seam. The seams caused chafing of the skin and blisters that were open to bacterial infection in the conditions in the trenches. This caused the extremely unpleasant condition known as 'trench foot', which resulted in many amputations. As Secretary of State for War, Kitchener organised a system of ensuring regular and frequent supplies of clean dry socks. Knitters were ordered not to finish socks with sewn seams but to join the toes by grafting, which seamlessly reproduces the structure of knitting. Some modern knitting manuals still refer to grafting as Kitchener Stitch (below).





The conservation of sock machines

Circular sock machines were beginning to be collected and restored at the time of our visit to the East Midlands in 1989. Ruddington Framework Knitters Museum and the Wigston Framework Knitters Museum near Leicester both had substantial collections, including machines maintained in working order and in use. Some machines were owned, maintained and used by individual craft knitters such as Louise Lee, who used to demonstrate at the Rural Life Centre (formerly the Old Kiln Museum) at Tilford near Farnham. The photograph (right) shows her knitting there in 1984, dressed in period costume. She continued to demonstrate at Rustic Sunday, an annual event held on the last Sunday in July, for many years, and bequeathed the machine to the museum in her will.

In the 1989 Wool Year, an appeal for circular sock machines for Godalming Museum produced three. These were restored to working order and demonstrated at several public events. Not all could be housed at the museum so two of them remained in my care, and came to be side-lined as other interests and responsibilities







arose. However, my recent presentation prompted me to raise the matter with Godalming Museum. This turned out to be a timely move because the museum is refurbishing its knitting gallery with expert technical help from a former employee in the industry. (Watch this space.)

Meanwhile since 1989 interest in the old sock machines has greatly increased, along with enthusiasm for the creative knitting and wearing of socks among craftspeople. In Britain a society of enthusiasts, who collect, restore and operate old machines, is named The Vintage Krankers. This is a reference to the basic mechanism of turning a handle and causing the latch needles to rise in grooves around a cylinder, grab the yarn and then fall,

drawing it through the loops of the previous round.

Examples of prices of antique machines advertised on-line in November 2017 included £350, £918, £958 and £1,350. Internationally the Circular Sock Machine Society, which originated in the USA in 2000 had 300 members in 2017 from the USA, UK, South Africa, Japan, Australia, Switzerland, Canada and New Zealand. Also in the USA, the Erlbacher Gearhart Knitting Machine Company (originally a manufacturer of parts for racing cars which diversified) makes new machines at Cape Girardeau, Missouri. A de-luxe model is priced at \$1,899).







SIHG Lecture - 30th January 2018 The Planning and Construction of High Speed 1

The High Speed 1 line links St Pancras Station to the Channel Tunnel terminal and was the first brand new railway to be built in the UK for a hundred years. With a total length is 67 miles including 17 miles in tunnels, it is designed for a maximum speed of 300 km/h. Designed for both passengers and freight, it was built on time and to budget.

Doug Irvine explained that he would divide his talk into three sections, namely:

- 1. Evolution & Planning
- 2. Aspects of Construction
- 3. Archaeology & Heritage.

Evolution & Planning

The main milestones were as follows. In 1971 British Rail and SNCF produced a scheme for a London-Paris link. In 1987 the Channel Tunnel Act was passed. It was assumed at this stage that in UK the existing domestic track would be used between London and the coast, the idea of having a separate High Speed link initially getting a hostile reception. By 1990 the digging of the tunnel had been completed, meanwhile in France they were already building a High Speed link to Paris. In 1991 a new BR report was issued showing possible routes for an 'eastern' High Speed link which, among other things, would provide for the regeneration of parts of East London. 1996 saw the passing of the Rail Link Act, and the contract for this work was awarded to London & Continental Railway.

In 1998 project funding was re-structured and this included financial support by both the Government and Railtrack. In the same year construction of the link got under way. In 2001 Railtrack went into receivership and in 2002 Network Rail was set up as a public body. In 2010 the Government sold its stake to a Canadian company but by this time, in 2007, the link had been completed and trains were running. The foregoing lists only the bare bones of events but, as can be seen, the project had a somewhat convoluted beginning.

Aspects of Construction

The section of line from St Pancras to Dagenham is nearly all in tunnel. This was all soft ground tunnelling. the cross-section being twin bores of 7.15m diameter with cross passages. For this tunnelling operation Tunnel Boring Machines (TBMs) were used. A TBM is a giant machine with a rotating cutting head. A screw conveyor picks up the spoil, this being disposed of by means of a conveyor. When a section of tunnel has been excavated precast concrete lining segments are brought up to the face and installed to form a ring. The segments are reinforced with steel fibres to prevent damage during handling. Jacks are then used to push the TBM forward to excavate the next section. The cutting head is subjected to a lot of wear and so its cutters need to be regularly sharpened. The cross passages, intended primarily for emergency evacuation, were all excavated by hand. Here the excavated profile was first stabilised with sprayed concrete before being fitted with steel liners. The spoil from all these operations was utilised at Stratford to raise the general ground level to enable the regeneration work to go ahead.

The geology of the London/Essex section is part of an old river valley, consisting of gravels, clay, Thanet sands and chalk. Stratford station was designed as a 'box' and constructed using diaphragm walling techniques. Because of ever rising ground water levels (0.7m per year) in this area, deep wells had to be drilled to prevent uplift on the box structure.

A 3km tunnel near Thurrock takes the line under the Thames. This was built using a total of seven TBMs working in highly fissured chalk containing flints, an extremely hard material. It was considered at the outset that this would be one of the most risky parts of the link to construct, however in the event it proved reasonably trouble free.

Tunnelling under the Kent North Downs (Bluebell Hill) was all in hard rock, and the cross-section is a single bore. This was excavated with a road-header using the New Austrian Tunnelling Method (NATM) which involves, among other things, putting on a sprayed-on concrete lining.

The line crosses the River Medway on a new bridge, positioned adjacent to two existing highway bridges, (see page 1). The profile and span of the new bridge is similar to the existing bridges to minimise the visual impact. The viaduct sections were constructed by the push-launch method, ie. constructed on land and jacked out onto the piers, while the main span used the balanced cantilever technique. Further east a new bridge at Tutt Hill was needed to take the line over the M20. Here the new bridge was constructed 'off-line' and jacked into position during a night-time possession.

Whereas the electrical system of the domestic line is third-rail 750 volt DC, HS1 is 25,000 volts AC throughout with an overhead catenary. All signalling is 'in-cab', controlled from the Ashford signalling centre. For much of its route in Kent the route follows the M20 corridor. At Lenham freight loops are provided, allowing slower freight traffic to be marshalled until train paths are available at night when passenger traffic has ceased.

Fastest travel times from London to Brussels are now 1hr 51 min, and to Paris 2hr 15 min. Trains from Ramsgate and Canterbury also now use part of the new network, giving much improved journey times for these destinations.

Archaeology and Heritage

We were shown slides of two archaeological sites that were uncovered during excavation work. The first was an Anglo-Saxon cemetery near Cuxton in Kent. This had first been discovered during the construction of the London to Chatham railway in the 1860s. It contained graves from the 6th to 7th centuries. Not far from there, under Bluebell Hill, they found postholes in the chalk, this being evidence of a Neolithic longhouse about 6000 years old. Although such longhouses are well documented in northern France this was reckoned to be the first one of its type found in Britain.

On the subject of heritage, in Mersham near Ashford a 15th century house known as Bridge House was on the centreline of the proposed line. Being of somewhat fragile construction it was decided that the only safe way to retain the integrity of the house was to move it bodily. A ring-beam was therefore cast under the foundations and four skidways put down. Bridge House was jacked up and slowly moved about 100 yards to its new location with no damage. Services were reconnected and the residents moved back in. A successful and relatively cheap answer to the problem.

The talk was well illustrated with slides, many showing methods of tunnelling and construction in particularly clear detail. We are grateful to Doug Irvine for a very informative lecture.



Treasurer's Report: The Stuart Chrystall charity (COIF) account has been merged with another COIF account but the Stuart Chrystall bequest is intact: in fact Stuart Chrystall bequest amounts have in the past been paid from other accounts because these accounts paid lower interest than the Stuart Chrystall account.

Bob Bryson pointed out that the £392 shown as AGM expenses in the accounts is in fact the cost of three plaques for future use as Conservation Awards.

The value of the group is very healthy at £39,460 as at 31st March 2017. This is invested in financial assets and no additional value is attributed to the stocks of books, plaques, goodwill or etc.

An amount for gift aid has been allocated to SIHG in the Surrey Archaeological Society Accounts but as it has not yet been received by SIHG it is not yet in the SIHG accounts.

Surrey Industrial History Group Chairman's Report for the year ending 31 March 2018

This is my thirteenth annual report (unlucky for some) as Chairman of the Surrey Industrial History Group. The first event of the year was, as usual, the South East Region Industrial Archaeology Conference. This year the event was hosted by the Sussex Industrial Archaeology Society and held at Worthing College on 22 April 2017.

Our AGM was held on 15 July at the Rural Life Centre in Tilford, when Vice Chairman Pam Taylor presented Norman Emblow with the 2018 Conservation Award. Norman was responsible for leading the project to dismantle Deek's Frimley Green Cycle Workshop, which ceased trading in 2002, and having the building and contents transferred to the Rural Life Centre.

The 42nd series of Industrial Archaeology Lectures held in Guildford commenced on 10 October with a lecture on the R101 Airship by Dr Bryan Lawton of the Newcomen Society and concluded on 5th March with a talk on the preservation of the SS Shieldhall by her Chief Engineer Graham Mackenzie.

The Thursday morning weekly talks at the Institute in Leatherhead were again organised by Margaret Levett who arranged the speakers and John Boume who chaired the meetings. The talks, held over both the autumn and spring terms, commenced on 5 October with a talk by James Preston on airports in Kent that were proposed but not developed. On 15 March Richard Savage gave the last lecture in the series to the Leatherhead group on Alexander Raby and Downside Mill. The final meeting at Leatherhead, held on 22 March, was open to various talks given by the members.

Membership of the group at the last count was 95, made up of 79 ordinary members, 6 Associate, 7 Institutional and 3 honorary; a further eight down on last year; however a couple of members have since renewed their subscriptions.

Our Newsletter and website www.sihg.org.uk continue to be the best source for up to date information on group activity and I would like to thank all the members of SIHG, especially my fellow committee members, who have supported the work of the group throughout the year.
