VISIT TO WILMINGTON PRIORY AND HERSTMONCEUX CASTLE

arranged by Josephine Carter

Wednesday 20th April

This is a joint visit with the Surrey Industrial History Group

8.30 a.m. Coach departs from Guildford, rear of B.R. Station in Guildford Park Road.

9.00 a.m. Dorking Halls.

9.15 a.m. Reigate, opposite the Red Cross public house, at the junction of West Street, High Street, and Park Lane.

9.30 a.m. South Godstone, A22 bus bay near the Railway public house.

9.45 a.m. Coffee break at Felbridge Hotel, near East Grinstead (TQ 371398).

10.15 a.m. Leave for Wilmington (TQ 545043)

Wilmington Priory (Benedictine) was the "Estate Office" for the English possessions granted to the Norman Abbey of Grestain by the Conqueror's half brother, Robert. In 1414 it was suppressed by Henry V.

The church of SS. Mary and Peter was built to serve both the monks and the village. In 1925 the Duke of Devonshire sold the farmland and conveyed the Priory to the Sussex Archaeological Society who use it as a small museum of agricultural and rural life. The Duke also placed in the care of the Society, the Long Man of Wilmington, nearby. Is he Balder, the Norse God of Spring? We shall never know. There is also a memorial to John Jeffrey Farnol.

Lunch: We hope to have the lunch break at Herstmonceux Castle, whose catering arrangements for 1988 are not yet prepared. If the tea shop is not supplying snacks and light lunches, other arrangements will be made for pub lunches.

The grounds of Herstmonceux include a Nature Trail, Elizabethan formal gardens and much of interest to see before the guided tour.

The castle was built in 1441, gutted in 1771 to build Herstmonceux Place, so, apart from the attractive outer shell, it is largely 20th century. It is now the responsibility of the Department of the Environment and is used for the work of the Royal Greenwich Observatory. NOTES

16 Long Garden Walk East, Farnham (SU 838470)

The site lies to the rear of properties on the east side of Castle Street (nos. 16-20) and was recently subject to planning permission, with a condition imposed allowing for an archaeological investigation. Trial trenching of the open part site prior to demolition of the existing buildings failed to reveal any archaeological features and, Victorian material excepted, only

produced a handful of Roman and Medieval potsherds.

However, following demolition works, site watching of the developer's footings showed that the original trial trenches had neatly missed a number of pits and ditches of late and post Medieval date. One of the larger ditches, approximately 1.5m deep and 2m wide, ran part way across the site, on a NW-SE alignment and may possibly be part of the earthwork defences put up hastily around the town during the Civil War. The fill showed no signs of silting levels, hinting that the ditch had been backfilled shortly after its original construction and the pottery recovered was consistent with a mid seventeenth century date. It may be possible to trace this feature further, as another development is due shortly just to the north of the existing site. The remaining ditches and pits are of equally uncertain purpose, but may represent animal pens and cesspits.

Possible Iron Ore Extraction Pits, Stony Copse, Alfold (TQ 048 357)
Stony Copse, a small irregular area of woodland extending approximately 100m in each direction, at Great Wildwood Farm, Alfold, is full of shallow pits. They vary from about 2m to about 4m in diameter and are very close together, sometimes overlapping. They bear a strong resemblance to the known iron ore "mine-pits" found in Hambledon Hurst and in Minepit Copse, south of Tigbourne Farm, Witley. The soil is Weald Clay and lumps of clay ironstone can be found generally in the area. It is tentatively suggested that the pits in Stony Copse are filled-in bell pits from which ore was extracted for the Vachery iron-working site, the hammer forge of which was approximately 1.9 km north-east of Stony Copse. These pits do not appear to have been previously recorded.

Mr. Hugh Thompson has kindly agreed to chair the meeting. There will be talks by Rob Poulton on his excavations at Saxon County School, Shepperton (finds of Roman to medieval date, especially important for the Saxon period); by Phil Jones on recent work in Staines (the results of recent excavations); by Geoff Potter on Kingston Bridge (recent extensive excavations of the bridge and nearby buildings, with finds including parts of medieval boats used as revetments); by Paul Stokes on the work of the Surrey Heath Group (especially the excavations in Bagshot and Roman Lightwater); and by John Hampton on archaeological aerial photography in Surrey (including many new sites he has recently identified).

A major part of the Symposium will be, as usual, the exhibits of current work by local groups, and the opportunity to meet like-minded people and discuss mutual problems and interests.
