The Future of SIHG

Since Covid, SIHG has been largely a virtual group, holding 15- 20 Zooms a year on Thursday mornings, with only the very occasional physical meetup (for example, to visit Gatwick Aviation Museum.) The late Bob Bryson did an enormous amount of work, acting as treasurer, programme secretary and more, to keep the group going. Now that Bob is no longer with us, we need to change to survive.

The committee has met a few times and made some key decisions, the most important being to restart live talks at Leatherhead in addition to doing Zoom talks. The live talks will be at 2.00 p.m. on Thursdays at Leatherhead Oddfellow Hall (doors open 1.30), while the Zooms will be at 7.30 p.m. on Thursday evenings (doors open 7.15). We would have preferred Thursday mornings for live talks but could not find a suitable hall that was available. We also decided to try holding Zoom talks in the evenings to cater for people who are at work during the day.

In addition we no longer have a treasurer role; our funds now being held by the Surrey Archaeological Society, our parent organisation.

Regarding the programme, which has been compiled by Michael Herbert, Garry Brooks and John Bourne, we have tried to broaden its scope by including talks which focus on industrialisation's social history, with talks on some of those brilliant individuals who contributed hugely to the industrial revolution. Other events include a play and a day conference on GPS. You may also notice that on the October to April programme four of the speakers are female and over half of the speakers are new to SIHG.

Next year we hope to organise some days out. Candidates include a visit to the Rural Life Museum in Tilford, near Farnham; the Basingstoke Canal; one of Richard Shenton's tours on industrial archaeology; and an 'Engineers and Railways Tour' of Kensal Green cemetery, which is the final resting place of Brunel and many other greats of the industrial revolution.

Lastly, although the group intends to change, we all still want it to be a place where you can come along and chat with friends. The Zooms will stay open for a post-talk chat, and now we are running Leatherhead live talks again we can go for a drink after. Any suggestions?

Introducing: Robert Mee



Our October speaker, Robert Mee, is a local historian of the Derbyshire / Nottinghamshire border area. He has been involved in local history for many years, and on retirement he went back to university, gaining an M.A. in English Local History at Leicester.

Robert is from a former mining area and often speaks about the industrial development of his hometown. Many of his talks, however, are not purely local. He can address audiences around the country by Zoom, and he is just as happy talking about village lockups, alms houses, or the Midlands' castles. During lockdown, Michelle joined a project transcribing documents for the Foundling Hospital, and she became fascinated with witches' marks and other methods of averting evil used in medieval times; completely different topics which both sparked further research and added to the talks which she delivers in person or via Zoom.
