

# LiDAR Portal

The <u>Surrey LiDAR Portal</u> is an on-going online interactive citizen science map which includes various LiDAR datasets for all of Surrey, including the historic county, as well as historic maps and HER data to help in analysing the imagery.

LiDAR has enormous potential to uncover previously unknown archaeological features, and by helping map and interpret these sites online, volunteers can work to build a more complete story of the local landscape. Anyone is welcome to register for a free account, which will allow access to the interactive map. Volunteers who would like to be involved and help in digitising features should read the available tutorials and are encouraged to attend online training sessions (please contact us at <u>outreach@surreyarchaeology.org.uk</u> if you are interested, as we can discuss arranging a bespoke session).

### One thousand years of solitude?

The Prehistoric Group has arranged a free Zoom talk by Paul Garwood of Birmingham University (Senior Lecturer in Prehistory) on **Tuesday 29 April** at 19:30 discussing the role of Neolithic pottery in south-east England, in the talk 'One thousand years of solitude? Social lives and transformation in the Middle and Late Neolithic of south-east England, 3500-2500 BC'. <u>Online booking</u> has been arranged to enable the Zoom link to be sent closer to the event.



#### Mystery object

The Society's Medieval Pottery Group recently examined an object that was donated in 1858, one of the first objects donated to the Society which was created in 1854. The heavy object is fired in a dark red clay and stands about 18cm high. It has a square, solid base and a round top with a circular, central hole. There is some damage by this hole with a section of the top missing. We asked online if anyone could identify this object or guess its use?

As usual, the online community did not disappoint and answers ranged from early medieval candlestick or wasp trap to grain mill. However, the most probable suggestion may be that it was 'a type of

vaulting tube from the 18th century. Good examples can be found in the Bank of England building'. Any other comments, please do send them our way, and many thanks for the networking and post-sharing which have led to the answers to date!

#### CBA-SE annual lecture on Stiances project


On **Tuesday 25 March** (19:00) CBA South-East will hold their annual AGM and lecture, this year by Simon Stevens (Archaeology South East) who will present on his ongoing Stiances Archaeological Project which, since 2009, has seen geophysical and topographic surveys and the targeting of hand-dug test-pits in a field called 'Little Stiances', revealing an assortment of post-medieval finds alongside a thin scatter of Mesolithic flintwork. ## SyAS Research Committee Grants

The Research Committee would like to remind all members that grants are available for Surrey projects and are available to Society groups with no budget and to external groups with limited resources. Society excavations such as Abinger in 2024 and post-excavation for Ashtead, Abinger and Flexford have been funded. Surveys, documentary research, training and scientific analyses are all suitable for consideration and have been supported by Society grants in recent years, such as work on the historic excavation at Lightwater and to enable a report on the more recent Hatch Furlong dig to commence. Scientific analyses are also specifically covered by funds from the Bierton and Slade bequests which have recently funded C14 dating for the Abinger excavation. Applications are considered throughout the year and the Committee's decision is final. Details and an application form are available on the website or from the office.
